Main Idea and Key Details

The **main idea** is what the story or passage is mostly about. It's like the big message or the central point the author wants you to understand. Think of it like the top of a pizza—the big thing that holds all the ingredients together!

Key details are the important parts of the story that support the main idea. They are the "ingredients" that help explain or prove the main idea. These could be: What the characters do? What problems happen? How things are solved?
